The Ball's Shepherd Reserve on central Ave. is the site of the T3C's first conservation lands. In 2008, it was sold to the T3C, "for a song," ensuring that the land on Ed Pond in East Falmouth would be protected long after she was gone. Jean also donated a conservation restriction on the adjacent property, which houses the small cottage where she lived for many years. On April 12, T3C dedicated the River Bend Conservation Area in memory of Bob Schwartzman, who died unexpectedly in August 2012. Bob was a dedicated and active member of T3C's board of directors, who championed our mission to preserve and protect Falmouth's special places. Many have expressed his passion through writing, trail mapping, leading walks and applying their tremendous energy to preserving open space. Bob embodied a continuous green corridor along the Coanesset River. River Bend is a key element of this greenway.

A third book is on the drawing table for this spring: a new team of students will build this book to The 300 Committee last fall, asking if there was a design and build project that he and his student could be involved in.

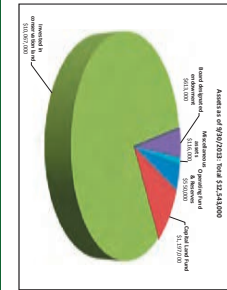
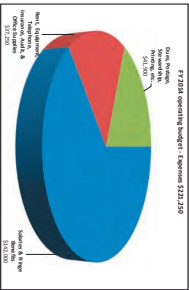
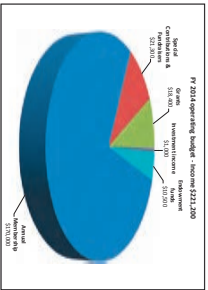
